Fast Food for a Healthy Heart: The Feast of Unleavened Bread

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Community Group Questions

Read Leviticus 23:5-8; Exodus 12:14-20, 13:6-8 and 23:18; Deuteronomy 16:3; 1 Corinthians 5:6-8; Matthew 16:6; Luke 12:1; Galatians 5:9; and 1 Peter 2:1-3.

1. What association or link did the ancient Hebrews see between their deliverance from Egypt and the Feast of Unleavened Bread? What did residence in Egypt represent?
 2. Outside of one parable in the New Testament in which the kingdom of God is likened to leaven, all references to leaven associate it with sin. (That parable is found in Matthew 13:33 and Luke 13:21 and likens the kingdom to leaven presumably because of its invisible operation as opposed to its corrupting influence.) So why is leaven such an apt symbol for sin? Describe what leaven does to bread dough.
 3. What sins does Jesus associate with leaven? What sins does Paul associate with leaven?
 4. How does the New Testament believer truly celebrate the Feast of Unleavened Bread? How does Jesus fulfill this Feast?
 5. Are there any “leftover crumbs” that need to be swept from your heart? What are the consequences of not conscientiously dealing with issues of sin that surface in your life?
 6. Memorize 1 Peter 2:1-3 and pray for one another that you will be encouraged to keep the Feast.
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
